

OMICRON UPDATE -- COVID-19 community transmission is at a substantial level, with the number of new cases per day at the highest level ever over the entire course of the pandemic. The majority of cases are the result of the Delta variant; and the majority of those hospitalized are unvaccinated. NEW INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL GUIDELINES FROM CDC REQUIRE NEGATIVE TEST 1 DAY BEFORE ENTERING

US – As before, people from other countries who are not fully vaccinated cannot travel to the U.S. NEW: People who are fully vaccinated can visit as long as they provide proof of a negative COVID-19 test within ONE day of traveling. For unvaccinated Americans, the guidelines already required proof of a negative test within one day of traveling. After travel, the CDC also suggests vaccinated travelers get tested three to five days after arriving in the U.S. and that unvaccinated travelers self-quarantine for a full seven days, even if they test negative during that timeframe. EVALUATING YOUR TRAVEL PLANS --

Courtney Niebrzydowsk, an international travel risk analyst at the University of Denver urges people to ask themselves two primary questions when they consider traveling: 1. Can this travel be postponed? and 2. How flexible can you be? She also urges people to think through all the scenarios that could emerge if they travel — like testing positive, facing a canceled return flight or learning last minute that their destination country has expanded its quarantine requirement — and map out detailed contingency plans, including costs, missed obligations and how to approach health care. Be prepared.

RESTRICTED TRAVEL FROM SOUTH AFRICA

-- As of November 26, 2021 the US government has decided to suspend and restrict the entry into the United States, as immigrants and nonimmigrants, of noncitizens of the United States ("noncitizens") who were physically present within the Republic of Botswana, the Kingdom of Eswatini, the Kingdom of Lesotho, the Republic of Malawi, the Republic of Mozambique, the Republic of Namibia, the Republic of South Africa, and the Republic of Zimbabwe during the 14-day period preceding their entry or attempted entry into the United States.

TONIGHT! LAFAYETTE/MAPLE HAVEN NEIGHBORHOOD FLOW ASSESSMENT NIGHT WORK STARTING AT MIDNIGHT --

The work involves lifting manhole covers to measure the flow in the pipe between two manholes, and will progress through the neighborhoods, one street at a time, **between midnight and 6 am, starting Monday night, through Dec 10**. The work affects the following:

- Suzanne Drive
- Simonds Road
- Wallis Road
- · Ocean Road
- Winchester Street
- Pamela Drive
- Denise Street
- Mariette Drive
- Nathaniel Drive
- Lafayette Road between Ocean Road and the Rye town line

The work area will be identified by large equipment with flashing lights, in the road; and will require a police detail on one night. Some delays should be expected for anyone using these streets during the testing times; but there will be no interruption to water or other utility services.

CITY SETS TAX RATE OF \$15.03 PER \$1000 OF ASSESSED VALUE — A reduction of 2% from the estimated tax rate proposed when the FY22 budget was approved. Based on assessed values, the median single-family home will pay \$7,203, compared to \$6,981 last year. Tax bills for the first half of the real estate tax due on Dec 20, 2021. CITY PHASING OUT EASYPARK PROGRAM – ENDS DEC 31, 2021 — EasyParkUSA has already discontinued the sale of new devices, although existing customers will be able to continue to use their devices in any participating New Hampshire city, and use up any remaining balance on their accounts, until December 31, 2021. Instead of EasyPark, the City's Parking Division encourages subscribers to sign up for the ParkMobile smartphone app, that gives them more convenience and flexibility. EMERGENCY RENTAL & UTILITIES ASSISTANCE — The NH Emergency Rental Assistance Program (NHERAP) provides funds to renters who cannot pay their rent and utilities during the pandemic. The program works with tenants and landlords. Program changes as of October 1, 2021:

- Households may qualify for assistance for past-due and future rent and utility payments for a period <u>not</u> to exceed 18 months.
- At least one person in the household must have qualified for unemployment benefits, had their income reduced, had significant costs, or had other financial hardship <u>during</u> the pandemic. Certain income requirements must be met.

WHAT THE PROGRAM COVERS

 Past-due rent including reasonable late and legal fees.

- Three months of future rent payments if needed for housing stability.
- Utilities, such as electricity, home heating costs, water, sewer, trash.
- Other housing-related costs such as internet and relocation expenses (including rental application fees, utility hook-up fees, and security deposits).
- Households may qualify for utility assistance even if they do not receive or need rental assistance.

PROOF-OF-VACCINATIONS: What should you do if you discover your vaccination is not recorded properly in the NH DHHS database? Or if you need more than your vaccination card because some travel destinations require the full record? Contact NHIIS (NH Immunization Information System) at 603-271-4028, by email at nhiis.support@dhhs.nh.gov or click here for the NH DHHS website https://tinyurl.com/rva3tphc for the immunization information system (NHIIS). On this site, select the correction forms for your PCP to verify your vaccine card, DOB, etc. You will need to get the form notarized and before sending it back to NHIIS. Once your record is corrected, you can request an official vaccine and immunization record. This record is the one that would be accepted when travelling if the vaccine card is not enough. I LOST MY PROOF-OF-VACCINATION CARD.

NOW WHAT? All vaccination records are kept on file in the CDC National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) system. NH DHHS advises that you can replace a lost vaccination card in either of two ways:

- Download and complete the vaccination card replacement request form here: https://tinyurl.com/4pj4chcz Note that the completed form MUST BE NOTARIZED before sending it back to NH DHHS.
- If your healthcare provider has access to the NHIIS, ask him/her to print out the record directly from NHIIS.
