

Criteria for Temporary Art

- Temporary Public Art is defined as a short-term installation, typically no more than one year. After one year, the artwork has the potential to become permanent if the piece is still in good condition. It must go through another review process to become permanent.
- A date for deinstallation must be submitted and the budget for Temporary Art must include deinstallation costs.
- PARC will have the authority and responsibility to manage and enforce the designated deinstallation date.
- Temporary Art must follow the applicable criteria of permanent public art, including all applicable permits.
- Temporary Art must be maintained by the sponsor(s) or responsible party throughout the public display period. The sponsor(s) or responsible party are responsible for the deinstallation.
